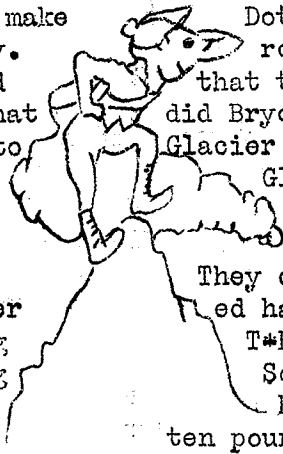
## TRIPS FORTHCOMING.....

Art Warren is with the Marine contingent in Iceland.

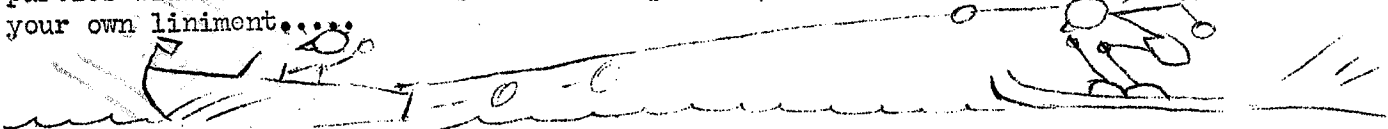

Jerry Hiatt, the Club's ace boomer, has moved to Los Angeles. So has George Sutin and Harold Stark. We'll miss 'em.

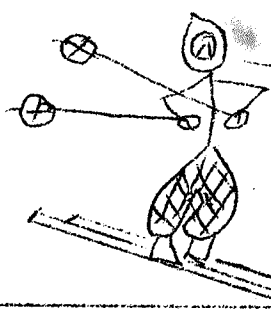
Barbara Curts will not ski with us next winter as she has returned to S.F. from whence she came. Matrimony?????

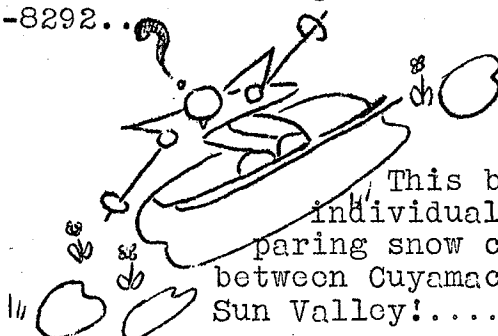
CUYAMACA MUD FEST.....

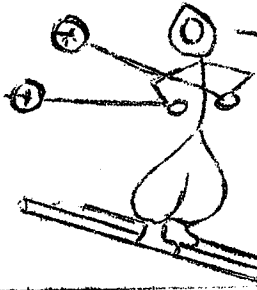
SAN DIEGO SKI PATROL COMES THRU....

## EAST MEETS WEST

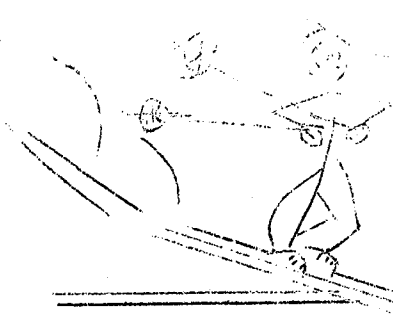

Now we are waiting for a directive from the Service Forces which will allow us to operate and to be available, as a unit, to the army or Navy for use in plane crash rescue work. We have been reassured by C. F. Dole, National Chairman, that such directives will be forthcoming.
